documentary filmmaker ray wheeler is down on his luck embroiled in a lawsuit he is reeling from the consequences of a near fatal shooting on his last film and has just lost his teaching gig broke and beleaguered he can t afford to be particular about his next project so when a former student invites him to film the comeback of lena wells an iconic rock and roll singer who hit it big in the seventies more than two decades earlier he reluctantly agrees even though he doesn t like her music when ray arrives at lena s hometown of medicine park oklahoma a defunct resort community he is determined to approach his topic with the professional detachment that has guided his career his work ethic is modeled on the prime directive of star trek never interfere with an alien civilization but with only five days left before lena s comeback concert ray quickly runs afoul of his subject who places him on a one week probation the terms impress her or else it doesn t take long before ray violates his own ethical standards drawn romantically toward lena he also fails to prevent himself from interfering with the lives of the people closest to her including her only son gram whose paternity is a mystery even to himself her daughter in law jettie and the enigmatic guitar player cyril dodge when disaster strikes ray s set again this time in medicine park he must face truths he has avoided for too long about love relationships and responsibility an ode to

parental relationship big ray is a staggering family story at once brutal and tender unusual and unsettling a juice box of suburban satire laced with alfred hitchcock the washington post a novel of art motherhood and the intensity of female friendships set in the posh hills above los angeles from the new york times bestselling author of california named one of the best books of the year by the washington post the boston globe san francisco chronicle new york observer huffington post the millions nylon vulture bustle high in the hollywood hills lady daniels has separated from her husband she s going to need help with their toddler son if she s going to finish the memoir she can t stand writing from a craigslist ad she hires s a magnetic young artist to live in the guesthouse behind the pool take care of lady s young son and keep an eye on her older teenage one s performs her job beautifully and quickly draws the entire family into her orbit but she isn t exactly who she seems as lady and s grow closer old secrets and new betrayals come to light jeopardizing what they hold most dear praise for woman no 17 woman no 17 is propulsive and moving and considers vital questions with empathy and sly intelligence a winning novel the new york times book review lepucki s exploration of personal relationships takes on an increasingly noirish tone much like chekhov s gun a swimming pool introduced early in the book takes on the shadows of a floating body long before the reader realizes this might be a possibility elle edan lepucki s woman no 17 is part family melodrama part twisty self reflection very funny gg while woman no 17 does possess all the trappings of a frothy page turner stormy arguments showy melodrama and oops an affair there are some quiet serious moments too it s the intersection between the two that makes this read both scintillating and thought provoking san francisco chronicle world gone water enlarges the portrait of charlie martens first introduced in vernon downs a young man grappling with how to navigate the world set in phoenix seven years before the events of vernon downs charlie finds himself released from a voluntary stay at a behavioral clinic in the sonoran desert the result of an incident with a woman he met while tending bar in florida where charlie had fled to forget his high school sweetheart whose sudden marriage to someone else devastates him but charlie s homecoming launches him into a chain of events with a cast of characters that assault his fragile state and further undermine his general impressions about life and how to live world gone water roves the deep terrain of our want for emotional connection and is a devastating narrative about love sex and friendship garden lakes jaime clarke s third novel featuring charlie martens finds charlie employed as an arizona newspaper columnist who has built his career on a deception he committed that inadvertently stirred up anti immigrant sentiment casting a pall over the state but charlie s story is really one of serial deception a life of prevarications he traces back to a summer fellowship program he attended while a junior at an all boys prep school the chosen fellows were tasked with undertaking supervised construction of a house in a half built development donated to the school by the bankrupt developer the fellows lived and worked together and were tested when a transient girl wandered into the development after the disappearance of both of the fellowship s chaperones what happened at garden lakes reverberates through everyone s lives but especially charlie s which is forever altered by his actions that summer a new york times new noteworthy selection all novels are necessarily concerned with their protagonists but what of the minor characters that fill out a novel s landscape we can never know them as well as we should or like the same is true for the trilogy of novels by jaime clarke vernon downs world gone water and garden lakes minor characters brings together clarke s previously published short stories featuring the supporting characters in his trilogy as well as stories by some of today s most talented contemporary writers who have chosen characters from the trilogy and contributed a story with a foreword by jonathan lethem and
