there was a time five hundred years ago when science was regarded as an art and art as a science and in the contest between the senses the ear through which we had previously received all knowledge and the word of god was conquered by the eye which would henceforth be king a new breed of painters aimed to reconcile the world of the senses with that of the mind and their goal was to conceal themselves in the details and vanish away like god a new way of perceiving was born anita albus describes the birth and evolution of trompe I oeil painting in oils in the fifteenth sixteenth and seventeenth centuries focusing her attention on works by northern european artists both major and minor as a scholar she stands in the tradition of panofsky as a painter she is able to see things others have not yet perceived as a storyteller she skillfully describes abstract notions in a vivid and exciting way like the multilayered technique of the old masters her method assumes an ability to distinguish between the different levels as well as a talent for synthesizing them the first part of the book is devoted to the visibility of the invisible in the art of jan van eyck his visual effects perspective artistic technique and philosophy the second and third parts are taken up with descriptions of the genres of forest landscape still life and forest floor in the midst of butterflies bumblebees and dragonflies vladimir nabokov emerges as final witness to the survival in literature of all that was condemned to vanish from the fine arts after a glimpse into the continuing presence of the past and some conjectures as to the future the book s final part throwsfresh light on the colored grains of the hand ground pigments that were lost when artists materials began to be commercially manufactured in the nineteenth century the art of arts is thus both a dazzling cultural history and the story of two explosive inventions the so called third dimension of space through perspective and the shockingly vivid colors of revolutionary oil paints albus



a very superior person reviewing the charming volume upon the art of silhouette by desmond coke speaks of the collecting and study of the silhouette as a quirk and of the

author as quirky such an attitude would of course apply to all and any art if we take the stand towards the activities of man say of a university youth stepping on to a london platform at the beginning of his self inflicted literary career and doggedly determined to maintain a high reputation for knowingness from the beginning it is like the fresh and delightful lads whom we impose upon our editorial friends as reviewers to find them patronizing our masterpieces as quite nice it is all very delicious and amusing but in what tense can the silhouette be deemed a quirk let us see the art of painting begins inevitably with drawing with expression by means of the point the result line this every teacher and academy realizes and has to realize more every great school of painting has evolved from it but this use of the point or drawing soon reaches its limitations and the brush demands mass or perhaps it is more correct to say that mass demands the brush the floating of masses on to canvas or paper with its edges holding the outline of the form is silhouette silhouette in other words is the basis of all mass impressions without a sense of silhouette we can utter no large and sublime moods yet strange to say the small part given to silhouette in the teaching of the art of painting in academies indeed more often the utter lack of it has always struck me as extraordinary to begin with the student should learn to utter the thing seen in mass as early as he is taught the point otherwise it is as though one expected to handle an orchestra by mastering the shrill possibilities of the tin whistle it is by consequence small wonder that our critic speaks of the silhouette as a quirk as a fact he who does not master the silhouette can never utter vast and majestic impressions in painting cotman one of the supreme masters of watercolor employed the silhouette for his masses in landscape with a skill and a beauty of handling which is the despair of the student yet the moment one comes to think of it how rare are the painters of th

unconventions is a quirky and provocative miscellany that reveals michael martone s protean interests as a writer and a writing teacher martone has shall we say a problem with authority his chief pleasure in knowing the rules of his vocation comes from trying out new ways to bend blend or otherwise defy them the pieces gathered in unconventions are drawn from a long career spent loosening the creative strictures on writing including articles public addresses essays interviews and even a eulogy these writings vary greatly in form but are unified in addressing the many technical and artistic issues that face all writers particularly those interested in experimental and nontraditional modes and forms martone s approach has always been to synthesize to understand and use any technique formula or style available i find myself then he writes self identifying as a formalist both and neither an experimenter and or a traditionalist in i love a parade an afterword martone writes about not fitting in and loving it as he recalls the time he marched alone in a local labor day parade as a one person delegation from the national writers union elsewhere in writings formally stylistically purposely at odds with themselves martone s expansive curiosity is on full display we learn about camouflage techniques how a baby acquires language how to read a wpa era post office mural and why martone sold his stock in the new yorker and reinvested his money in the company that makes etch a sketch unconventions then is martone s frankensteinian monster a kind of unruly hybrid spawn

of the mainstream writing enterprise writing seems to me an intrinsic pleasure an end in itself first says martone the question for me is not whether my writing or any piece of writing is good or bad but what the writing is and what it is doing and how finally it is used or can be used by others
