elizabeth a grosz born 1952 is an australian philosopher feminist theorist and professor working in the u s as of february 2024 she is jean fox o barr women s studies distinguished professor emerita at duke university in durham north carolina u s

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grosz then turns to corporeal experiences unique to women menstruation pregnancy childbirth lactation menopause her examination of female experience lays the groundwork for developing

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elizabeth grosz is professor of women s studies and literature at duke university usa she completed her ph d at the university of technology sydney australia in 1981

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grosz contends that feminist theory has largely imbibed these assumptions and this participates in the social devaluing of the body that goes hand in hand with the oppression of women 10 her three fold categorization of philosophical feminism reflects this judgment yet 230

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in its beginnings the women s movement as the struggle of suffragists and of existential feminists aspired to gain a place in linear time as the time of project and history in this sense the movement while immediately universalist is also deeply rooted in the sociopolitical life of nations

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in this article we rethink resilience and critique through a twofold manoeuvre first we draw on the writings of feminist philosopher elizabeth grosz who has been surprisingly ignored in most ir discussions

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elizabeth grosz is one of australia s best known feminist theorists and teaches in philosophy women s studies and critical theory at monash university in melbourne she is the author of

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book january 1 2018 exploring the fields of architecture philosophy and queer theory grosz shows how feminism and cultural analysis have conceptually stripped bodies of their specificity their corporeality and the vestigal traces of their production as bodies

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grosz s biological turn has produced an important and novel feminist reading of darwin s theory of evolution drawing upon darwin s ideas about natural and sexual selection grosz elaborated an ontology of biological matter in terms of the continuous unpredictable production of difference

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grosz gives a critical overview of lacan s work from a feminist perspective

discussing previous attempts to give a feminist reading of his work she argues for women s autonomy based on an indifference to the lacanian phallus

elizabeth grosz is professor of women s studies and literature at duke university she moved to the usa from australia to take up a position in the departments of comparative literature and english at suny buffalo she moved to the women s and gender studies department at rutgers university in 2002 and took up her position at duke in 2012
